#### Fat, Fetishized, or Forgotten? The Representation of Fat Bodies in Pornography

Amanda Bressler, M.A.

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Fat bodies in pornography exist at the intersection of fetishization and invisibility, reflecting broader societal attitudes toward desirability and sexuality. This poster examines the literature on how fat individuals are portrayed in adult content, the implications of these depictions for body image and self-perception, and the role of online spaces in shaping fat sexual representation. It explores the contrast between mainstream erasure and niche categorization, the impact of porn consumption on desirability politics, and the intersectionality of fatness with gender, race, and queerness. Additionally, the review considers the psychological and therapeutic implications for individuals navigating self-perception and intimacy in a media landscape that often marginalizes fat bodies. As digital spaces continue to evolve, this work highlights the importance of expanding representation beyond fetishization and toward affirming, diverse portrayals of fat sexuality.

### The Impact of Deep Fakes and Sexualized Misinformation on Politics, Privacy, and Trust

Jasmin Chamberlain, B.S.

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This presentation discusses the concerning expansion of deep fake technology and how it has contributed significantly to the spread of sexualized misinformation, especially in political and public spheres. Through advancements in artificial intelligence, malicious actors are now adopting deep fakes as a tool for manipulating public opinion, destroying individual reputations, and undermining trust in democratic institutions. From the vantage point of legal action, ethical considerations, and societal consequences, this poster presents how deep fake disinformation has a disproportionate influence

on marginalized communities, with a particular focus on women in politics and activism. Drawing from interdisciplinary research, it also provides solutions to mitigate harm through policy interventions, technological innovation, and civic education. As digital deception continues to advance, it is critical to counter these threats to safeguard privacy, integrity, and democratic discourse.

### Beyond the Bans: Resilience in the Face of Legislative Hostility for Non-Binary Adults

Jocelyn Cohen, M.A.

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This poster will present the results of a dissertation study that explores the lived experiences of non-binary (NB) adults within the current socio-political climate (from 2016 to 2024), with a focus on resilience. This is a qualitative study that uses Interpretative Phenomenological Analysis (IPA). The study examines how NB individuals navigate the increasing visibility of gender diversity alongside legislative efforts that restrict their rights. Grounded in the Minority Stress Model, the research investigates both distal (external discrimination, policy restrictions) and proximal (internalized stigma, identity concealment) stressors, while highlighting the community's adaptive strategies and resilience. Semi-structured interviews with NB adults provide insight into their gender journeys, sources of support, and experiences with community, visibility and legal barriers. By centering NB voices, this study offers a nuanced perspective on both the challenges and strengths of this community, aiming to inform clinical practice, policy advocacy, and social change initiatives that promote well-being and inclusivity.

#### **House and Ballroom Culture:**

A Culturally Responsive Mental Health Intervention for MSM Living with HIV in the Southern U.S.

Natalie Dolan, M.S.

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This presentation explores house and ballroom culture as a culturally responsive intervention for men who have sex with men (MSM) living with HIV in the southern United States. It highlights the unique mental health challenges faced by this population, particularly BIPOC individuals navigating multiple layers of minority stress. Clinical psychologists must understand these intersecting identities and integrate affirmative, sex-positive approaches to care. By recognizing the protective benefits of house and ballroom culture—such as community support, identity affirmation, and resilience—mental health providers can deliver more inclusive, culturally competent, and effective treatment.

#### **Racial Discrimination within Online Dating**

Lily Kyriakides-Crowe, B.A.

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As the use of online dating platforms to find a romantic partner increases among American singles, some scholars wonder whether dating sites will decrease racial barriers that limit in-person dating and marriage markets. Freed from discrimination rooted in legalized segregation, virtual dating venues should provide increased opportunities for people of color to find matches. However, ethnoracial discrimination permeates online dating platforms, thus disadvantaging people of racial and ethnic minorities through limited potential matches and explicit acts of racism. This digital-sexual racism functions, in part, by the lack of accountability of disguising prejudicial stereotypes as personal preferences. The filters offered by online dating platforms perpetuate White heteronormative beauty standards, and result in a limitation of people of color's dating prospects and may further negatively impact their mental and physical health.

### Navigating Online Dating for Autistic Individuals: Benefits, Challenges, and Safety Consideration

Jaime Langosch, LPC

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This poster explores the benefits, challenges, and safety considerations of online dating for autistic individuals. It reviews literature on how digital platforms offer structured communication, reduced social pressure, and greater control over interactions. Challenges such as difficulties with social cues, navigating dating norms, and risks of exploitation are also examined. Additionally, the poster highlights safety concerns and strategies for mitigating risks, emphasizing the need for neurodivergent-friendly platforms and further research on long-term relationship outcomes. These findings provide insights for mental health professionals supporting autistic individuals in online dating.

#### **Digital Masculinity and Feminine Submission:**

The Intersection of Incel Ideology and the Trad Wife Movement in the Online Sphere

Lynette Maritza Lewis, B.A.

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I want to investigate the ideological intersection between incel communities and the trad wife movement, two seemingly distinct but interconnected subcultures that have gained popularity in recent years. Both movements revolve around rigid, often

reactionary views on gender roles—incels driven by frustration and resentment towards women and societal expectations of male sexual success. In contrast, the trad wife movement advocates for a return to traditional femininity, emphasizing female submission and domesticity. I will explore how these two spaces, though different in their outward goals, share common themes such as patriarchal values, anti-feminism, and the idealization of pre-modern gender roles. It will also delve into the cultural and political that contribute to the rise of these movements, focusing on their influence on gender dynamics and their broader implications for contemporary discussions around sexuality, relationships, and power structures.

## Bridging the Distance: Technology's Impact on Intimacy in Long Distance Relationships

Juhi Lilwani, M.A

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Advancements in technology have transformed long-distance relationships, enabling couples to maintain intimacy and connection despite physical separation. Video calls, sexting, long-distance sexual toys, Snapchat, and virtual reality tools have introduced dynamic ways for couples to engage to bridge emotional and physical gaps. These innovations transform the way intimacy is expressed and experienced, fostering closeness and connection through immersive experiences. As reliance on technology for intimacy increases, this presentation seeks to explore how individuals sustain emotional and physical closeness despite geographic separation. However, it also introduces new challenges including concerns about privacy, emotional dependency, and potential for miscommunication. By analyzing both the advantages and drawbacks of sexual connection using technology, it provides important implications for mental health professionals supporting clients and couples who rely on digital tools to maintain their relationships.

# Online Communities for Non-Offending Pedophiles: Balancing Stigma, Ethics, and Clinical Considerations Samantha Myers, B. Arts Sc.

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Pedophilia is a pattern of persistent and recurrent sexual attraction to prepubescent children. Highly stigmatized and frequently misunderstood, experiencing pedophilic urges does not inherently mean an individual will commit offenses. A subset of individuals, known as non-offending pedophiles, actively refrain from acting on their desires due to ethical, moral, and legal concerns. However, these individuals encounter significant barriers to seeking support due to widespread stigma and fear of social and legal consequences. As a result, online communities have emerged as judgment-free spaces for emotional support, discussing personal experiences, and sharing coping strategies. However, these digital spaces face intense societal backlash, raising concerns regarding harm reduction, reinforcement effects, and public safety. This presentation examines the benefits and risks of these platforms and the ethical dilemmas clinicians encounter when working with this population. By addressing these complexities, ethical, stigma-free approaches to support can be developed, prioritizing both individual well-being and public safety.

#### Virtually Healed: The Future of Exposure Therapy in a Digital World

Alex Mills, B.A.

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I am examining the relationship between virtual reality and trauma. Specifically focusing on how virtual reality can be used as a tool during exposure therapy for treatment of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). This allows for a recreation of traumatic environments within a controlled setting in which the therapist is able to help patients confront and process their trauma while the client is aware they are in a safe environment to do so. The approach of using VR in exposure therapy reduces the likelihood of re-traumatization, allows for perception changes leading to an increased understanding of recovery techniques, and encompasses a trauma informed approach to managing PTSD. This approach can benefit may struggling with PTSD, but specifically involving PTSD resulting from sexual assault traumas. This approach allows these individuals to build confidence and face challenging scenarios involving intimacy more gradually, rather than jumping straight into highly distressing and potentially re-traumatizing situations.

#### How The Use of Social Media Is Used to Learn About the Transgender Experience

Colin Rubright, M.A.

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With the rise in popularity of the internet and social media throughout the 21st century, the online documentation of transgender individuals' gender journey has become increasingly common. As a result, transgender individuals have gained access to their peer's experiences and sometimes utilized this to inform or guide their own decision making. Furthermore, researchers have found ways to process this data using tools like artificial intelligence to gain insight into the transition experience. This poster will investigate the potential utility and dangers of social media and other online technologies being used in these ways.

#### Age Gap and Lesbian Relationships

Delia San Martino, M.A.

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The age gap in romantic relationships has been mostly studied as a heterosexual phenomenon, with a specific focus on older-man-younger-woman relationships (Lehmiller & Agnew, 2011). However, statistics reveal that age-dissimilar relationships may have been more prevalent among lesbians and gay men than straight couples (Lehmiller & Agnew 2011). Within the Queer population, lesbian relationships have historically been under-considered and under-analyzed due to the "elusive nature" (Doolin, 2010) of the lesbian community. Subsequently, there seems to be a need to further investigate the relational, cultural, and sociopolitical dynamics embedded in lesbian relationships displaying a significant age discrepancy. Hence, the present research will attempt to address the following domains related to the age gap in lesbian relationships: geo-socio-political factors, barrier to lesbian youth when seeking community (Doolin, 2010), lesbian approaches to dating and courtship (Rose et al., 2002), going "beyond the happy future" (Chen, 2023), issues of identity differentiation (Walsh, 2024), and age as a relational attractor (Chen, 2023).

#### Weaponizing Loneliness: How Social Media Feeds the Incel Pipeline

Lauren Scott, B.A.

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More and more young men are finding themselves identifying with incel and misogynistic culture in the digital space. When the algorithms push content that utilizes emotional manipulation and pseudoscience to the front of many young men's screens, those seeking community and validation are especially vulnerable. The goal of this literature review is to explore this online ecosystem's ability to attract and indoctrinate new members and its proclivity for dangerous rhetoric to thrive.

#### The Ethics of Ethical Porn

Molly Schwibinger, B.A.

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In recent years, there has been a growing movement toward consuming ethical porn—but what sets "ethical porn" apart from other porn? How do individuals navigate the decision-making process between paid, exclusive content and free, unmonetized alternatives? This literature review will explore existing literature on the definition of ethical porn and the key factors that *go into* choosing what to *get off* to.

# A Phenomenological Exploration Of The Decoupling Of Gender & Sexual Behavior Within The Kink Community Hana Simon, M.A.

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This work explores the relationship between kink, gender identity and sexual orientation. Specifically, the work aims to study factors that are related to the choosing of partners in the context of kink that extend beyond gender itself. The research behind this study addresses different factors related to the practice and culture of kink, as well as the stigma associated with the kink community. Themes that have emerged from the six (6) participants interviewed involve feeling that the kink community is a welcoming space to explore and be flexible with one's sexuality, and that it allowed them to feel that they could define their gender more on their own terms rather than the norms prescribed by society, and that factors that determine who they choose to play within the context of kink extend beyond gender itself and have more to do with the roles within the specific kink scene.

# Technological Innovations in Sexual Health: Enhancing Intimacy and Agency for People with Disabilities Nikki Sharf, M.A.

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Sexuality is an integral part of the human experience, encompassing sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, pleasure, intimacy, and reproduction. Yet, people with disabilities (PwD) often face barriers to sexual expression due to physical, social, and attitudinal challenges. Emerging technological advancements are transforming the landscape of sexuality for PwD by addressing these barriers through inclusive and accessible innovations. Virtual reality enables immersive and judgment-free intimacy, Al companionship provides emotional and sexual support, adaptive sex toys offer solutions for physical limitations, and digital spaces foster peer support and sexual education. Together, these technologies empower PwD by promoting sexual agency and enhancing well-being. This poster presents a scoping review examining how these advancements are reshaping sexual experiences for PwD, with a focus on clinical implications for integrating technology into therapeutic practices, ethical concerns surrounding Al-driven intimacy, and future research directions to ensure equitable and sustainable development in this evolving area of sexual health.

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Emerging adults with disabilities face unique challenges in dating and forming romantic relationships, with rates of first marriage significantly lower than their non-disabled peers. While online dating offers an opportunity for many adults with developmental disabilities to meet potential partners, it also perpetuates ableism, gender norms, and stereotypical ideas about attractiveness. Emerging adults with disabilities, particularly those who also identify as LGBTQ+, may experience compounded discrimination in these spaces. Despite the growing use of dating apps, such as Tinder and Bumble, to initiate romantic relationships, many users with disabilities must navigate the dilemma of concealing or revealing their impairments. Online platforms, while providing anonymity, can also amplify stigmas around disability and attractiveness, influencing users' mental health and perceptions of desirability. This poster presentation will explore the strengths and challenges of individuals with developmental disabilities navigating digital intimacy on online dating apps.

#### Al and Intimacy: A Current, Brief Review

Jon Sussman, M.S.

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This poster examines the transformative impact of artificial intelligence on intimate human interactions. It explores how AI systems simulate human-like emotional responses, creating a phenomenon of "pseudo-intimacy" (Wu, 2024) and an authenticity paradox where programmed outputs evoke genuine feelings (Sullins, 2012). The review synthesizes evidence showing that AI-augmented interventions, such as online cognitive behavioral therapy, effectively reduce symptoms of depression and anxiety (Lee et al., 2021). At the same time, the poster highlights risks including over-reliance on technology, maladaptive attachment styles, diminished interpersonal skills, reinforcement of social biases, and privacy concerns. Organized into sections covering the introduction, current landscape, results, and conclusions, this poster underscores the need for ethical safeguards and longitudinal research to ensure that AI enhances rather than undermines authentic human connection.

# Exploring Online Dating Experiences of LGBTQ+ Emerging Adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder Megan Thomason, B.A.

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This poster presentation reviews literature on the online dating experiences of LGBTQ+ emerging adults with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Traditional in-person dating can be challenging for LGBTQ+ individuals due to stigma, safety concerns, and limited opportunities to meet people who share their identities and values. For those who are also diagnosed with ASD, additional barriers such as social communication differences and sensory sensitivities further complicate dating. Online dating can provide a safer and more accessible space for exploring identity and relationships, offering increased autonomy and reduced social pressure. This presentation highlights how digital spaces empower LGBTQ+ individuals with ASD in romantic relationships while also addressing potential risks and barriers. A holistic approach, incorporating biopsychosocial and cultural factors, will guide the discussion.

# A Look into the Influence of Arranged Marriage Culture on American Desis' Use of Mobile Dating Applications. Niti Vora, M.A.

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The purpose of this study is to investigate the impact of arranged marriage culture and lived experiences of the utilization of mobile dating apps among American South Asians. This study aims to explore how traditional values and cultural expectations surrounding arranged marriages influence the preferences, behaviors, and experiences of American South Asians when engaging with mobile dating platforms. By examining the intersection of arranged marriage traditions and modern dating practices through the lens of mobile technology, this research seeks to uncover insights into the adaptation and negotiation of cultural norms within the context of contemporary dating dynamics among American South Asians. This study will also provide insight for clinicians who work with American South Asians in the dating population in order to provide culturally competent care.

# Barriers To Care: Systemic Racism in Black Women's Sexual and Reproductive Health Morgan Watkins, M.A.

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Black women in the United States are facing serious physical and mental health crises due to systemic discrimination in reproductive and sexual healthcare services. Black women have faced reproductive and sexual injustices for centuries. Contemporary systemic racism compounds upon these historical foundations, further limiting Black women's access to care, quality education, insurance, and home environments, and perpetuating discriminatory policies at an institutional level. Interpersonally, implicit biases and individual provider prejudices, which are impacted by systems-level ideologies, further contribute to disparities in Black women's sexual and reproductive healthcare. In combination, these issues have influence elevated rates of maternal morbidity and mortality, STIs and STDS, and HIV. Race-based inequality such as this has been linked to a breadth of mental health difficulties, which have a bidirectional relationship with reproductive and sexual health. Addressing these inequalities requires both systemic and individual change and a dismantling of racist medical dogma.

# Swipe Right! The Impact of Dating and Hookup Apps on Racial and Ethnic Minority Gay Male Users Dylan Wijas, M.A.

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It is becoming increasingly popular to find a significant other or sexual partner on dating and hookup apps, especially for individuals with same-sex preferences. As a result, I will examine the intersection between dating and hookup app usage and gay males with intersecting racial or ethnic minority identities. Specifically, I will detail experiences of racism and fetishization that gay racial or ethnic minority males face and how they influence the mental health and well-being of these users. In addition, I will explore the protective factors that dating and hookup apps can provide for gay males with racial or ethnic minority intersecting identities.

## **Online Dating for Mental Health Clinicians**
